Mikkeli's 10th Illustration Triennial returned to its roots this year with the free theme, execution and technique for the entered illustrations. The exhibition features 96 pieces of work from 39 illustrators. Mikkeli Art Museum and the Association of Visual Communication Designers in Finland, Grafia, have organised the Illustration Triennial together for the 10th time this year. The Association of Finnish Illustrators, Kuvittajat, participated in the organisation for the third time.

Mikkeli's Illustration Triennial was launched in 1987. Over the last few decades, the Finnish field of illustration has undergone some major changes. Nowadays, Finnish illustrators are known worldwide, and illustration spreads outside its traditional publication channels in our visualised culture. Thus, Mikkeli's 10th Illustration Triennial showcases the wide variety of illustrations today and the diverse ways of using illustrations from architecture to books. All illustrations chosen for the exhibition have been published in the last three years.

In total, 80 illustrators with 228 pieces of work participated in the competition. The illustrations for the exhibition were chosen by a jury of illustrators who were Emmi Jormalainen, Eili-Kaija Kuusniemi, Jukka Lemmetty, Sanna Mander and Kari Piippo as well as the Museums Director Matti Karttunen. They also selected the awarded illustrations.

The exhibition's invited guest is the well-known London-based Irish illustrator, children's author and designer, Chris Haughton. His debut children's book, A Bit Lost (Borim Press 2009), redefined in many ways the form. Haughton perceives the pages of a picture book as theatrical stages. His style is characterised by his masterful use of space and timing and the awareness of the power of strong, yet simple character design. The book has been translated into 19 languages, and it has won a number of awards all over the world. Haughton's other picture books are Oh No, George!, (Walker Books 2012) and the most recently published We Have a Plan (Walker Books 2014).

Chris Haughton is also known for his fair trade work. In 2007, he was listed in Time Magazine's Design 100 for his cooperation with the fair trade company People Tree. In 2011, he co-founded MadeByNode with Akshay Sthapit. Node's aim is to create a worldwide cooperation network of well-known designers and Nepalese rug weavers. In 2013, London Design Museum held an exhibition presenting the rugs produced through this cooperation.
